ONLINE WINTER SCHOOL IN MIGRATION STUDIES: "South Asian Perspectives on International Migration"

Description

International migration undoubtedly represents an essential key to understanding the contemporary world and the 'migration paradigm' has become a powerful tool to analyze societal and spatial transformations at the local, national and global levels. This dynamic research field has been largely dominated by the knowledge and conceptual tools produced in the destination countries of the global North which have also imposed their policy agenda.

This online multidisciplinary winter school will bring together post-graduate students, practitioners and academics based in South Asia, Europe and North American and will allow them to explore the frontiers of migration studies research and policy-making, with a focus on the dynamics and challenges faced by countries of origin in South Asia. It aims to foster collaborative research, knowledge production and discussions on this essential topic.

It will comprise interactive thematic lectures, group discussions and methodological workshops through the lenses of anthropology, sociology, history, public policy and urban studies to provide an in-depth understanding of a complex and multifaceted phenomenon having a profound impact on South Asian societies and the world at large.

<u>Five morning sessions</u> (10:00am to 12:00pm) : discussions on a wide range of methodological and theoretical approaches, as well as policy-oriented topics in migration studies, introducing students to qualitative and quantitative research methods and ethical issues pertaining to migration research; migration governance and international migration laws; migration, gender and development; human security, migration and the nation-state.

<u>Five afternoon thematic sessions</u> (1:00 to 4:00pm) : presentions on cutting-edge and empirically grounded research addressing the following aspects: temporality and spatiality of South Asian migrations; migration, borders and citizenship: an EU-India comparison; climate induced migrations in South Asia; regional cultures of migration (Bangladesh, East and West Punjab, Nepal); migration and religion.

The 25 contact hours of teaching will be supported by a wide range of material (readings, media coverage, archives, films, etc.) that will be shared by selected participants in advance.
