## NSU News

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

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


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

### Honorable Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina Congratulates NSU Student-Lead Cast of *Bangabandhu*



Her Excellency Sheikh Hasina, Prime Minister of Bangladesh and Ms. Sheikh Rehana with Dibya Joyti, an NSU student, and the cast of the movie *Bangabandhu*.

Dibya Joyti, a student of North Bachelor of South University's Science in Economics program, has been selected to portray the character of young Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in the Bengali biopic titled Bangabandhu. Mr. Joyti was informed about this opportunity in late December, 2020, and, on a Thursday afternoon in late January, 2021, he confirmed the good news to Prothom Alo - a renowned Bangladeshi newspaper that covered Mr. Joyti's news. Mr. Joyti, along with his mother, actress Shahanaz Khushi, and his father, actor Brindabon Dash, is ecstatic to have gotten this opportunity.

Mr. Joyti told Prothom Alo "Our family of four all have read Bangabandhu Sheikh Muiibur Rahman's autobiography. Т have always heard stories about Bangabandhu from my parents. The fact that there is a cinema being made about the best Bengali to have existed in a thousand years, and that I have gotten the chance to play the role of this Bengali's teenage-self in the cinema is something, I think, nothing else can surpass in terms of luck. You could say that I am in a daze."

During this time, Dibya Joyti, to know more details about Bangabandhu Mujibur Sheikh Rahman, went to meet Sheikh Hasina, Bangabandhu's daughter and the Prime Minister of Bangladesh, and her sister Sheikh Rehana. Mr. Joyti informed Prothom Alo that, on January 9, 2021, in four hours, he learnt a lot about Bangabandhu from them which he never even learnt from books and various footages. However, he thinks it would be quite challenging to characterize this particular role since there is a lack of video clips of Bangabandhu in his teenage years on the internet in contrast to the availability of video clips and pictures of Bangabandhu in his mature years.

Nonetheless, Mr. Joyti said, "Despite the lack of documentaries and video footages of Bangabandhu in his teenage years, on meeting the Prime Minister and her sister, I have learnt a lot of things that will greatly help me with my acting. They informed me about various incidents involving their father, Bangabandhu, during his teenage years, his characteristics, their relationship with their parents, and Bangabandhu's demeanor and gait." Furthermore,

Mr. Joyti informed Prothom Alo that after he had been selected for the role, a special pass was organized for him from the Bangladesh Film Archive so that he can learn additional information about Bangabandhu. This also helped him get inside the mind of the character he is to play.

Mr. Joyti was set to go to Mumbai that month with a lot of other coactors and co-actresses to shoot for the Bangabandhu biopic. The film, made by Bangladesh and India collaboratively, is directed by Bollywood's Shyam Benegal.

Upon inspiration aroused by his parents, Mr. Joyti, in 2014 when he was in grade 6, started acting in the TV-serial "Shontan." Later on, he, along with his twin brother Shoumo Joyti, acted in numerous TV-serials such as "Happy Family," "Joint Family," etc. However, through acting in the film directed by Akram Khan and funded by the government, Nokshikathar Jamin, the siblings first introduced themselves as film actors. The biopic Bangabandhu will be Mr. Joyti's second film. Not only Mr. Joyti and his family, but NSU is also ecstatic to hear of his honorable achievement.



#### **International Mother Language Day 2021**

The first private university and the number one ranked private university of Bangladesh, North South University (NSU) organized a virtual discussion session on "International Mother Language Day 2021" at North South University (NSU) on Sunday, 21 February, 2021.

Dr. Gour Gobinda Goswami, Director, Office of Student Affairs, NSU delivered the introductory speech at the beginning of the session.

On the occasion of International Mother Language Day 2021, various activities were taken up. The program started at 12.01 am on 21st February with laying down flowers and litting Candles at NSU Shahid Minar to pay tribute to the martyrs of the great language movement. The national flag was hoisted at 6 am and kept at halfmast. This virtual discussion session and cultural program were organized to highlight the significance of the great language movement and to perpetuate the memory of the language movement of 1952 to the new generation.

Founder Chairman & Director, Southeast Bank, Mr. M. A. Kashem, Former President, FBCCI and Chairman, Board of Trustees (BOT), North South University was present as the Chief Guest. Freedom Fighter Lion Mr. Benajir Ahmed, Former Chairman & Member, Mr. Azim Uddin Ahmed, Member, Board of Trustees, North South University were present as Special Guests. Professor M. The Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signing ceremony among Bangladesh Computer Council (BCC), North South University (NSU), and The Miyazaki University of (UoM), Japan for Post Bangladesh Japan Training (BJET) ICT Engineers; Implementation Agreement have been signed on 24th February 2021 at the ICT Tower, Agargaon, Dhaka.

The Career and Placement Center (CPC) of NSU has been leading the project on behalf of NSU from the beginning under the leadership of Professor Mohammad Khasro Miah, Director of CPC. Being the department in charge of career, internship, and job placements, CPC of North South University is always working on creating a bridge between the students and the corporate world. The MoU signed among BCC, NSU and UoM have added another feather to their crown of success.

In this regard, "The project for skills Development of IT Engineers Targeting Japanese Market" will serve our students to a great extent. This MoU will create further opportunities for the students to learn more about their career opportunities and prepare them for their future career track. At least 80 students will get chance to enroll in this program with a fee of 10,000 Taka

only. The first six months of the training module will be held at NSU, and the second three months module will be held in Japan. Completing the modules will open up enormous job opportunities for our engineering students. The program aims to support the capacity development of Bangladeshi ICT engineers and future ICT engineers who have the potential to create business networks between Japan and Bangladesh.

Ismail Hossain, Pro Vice-Chancellor, NSU, Mr. MA Kashem Honorable Chairman, Board of Trustees, Dr. Katherine Li, Director, Office of External Affairs, Professor Norman K. Swazo, Director, Office of Research-NSU, Muntasir Mamun labal, Director, Institutional Ranking Cell (IRC), Dr. Md. Nurul Kabir, Research Coordinator, School of Business and Economics (SBE), Dr. Mamun Molla, Research Coordinator, School of Engineering and Physical Sciences (SEPS), Professor Sk. Tawfigue M. Hague, Research Coordinator, School of Humanities and Social Sciences (SHSS), Dr. Asim Kumar Bepari, Research Coordinator, School of Health and Life Sciences (SHLS) and faculties from different departments of NSU. Director, IRC stressed the importance of academic partnerships for ranking. Director, CPC emphasized the internship opportunities that also are an important strategic interest in partnership.

The prime objective of the workshop was to discuss working collectively toward the goal of making our efforts both more integrated and strategic. During the workshop, the Director of Office of Research mentioned that they have been collecting and keeping record of the research interest areas of every department of the four respective schools of NSU for quite a while now. He made two specific recommendations:

1. Dean and research coordinator for each school can meet with department chairpersons to review both the general list MoU and the school-specific list MoU (that I provided earlier) to identify which institutions should have priority for prospective research contacts from school faculty. The idea would be for each department chair to review the department faculty list at the prospective collaborating institution to identify research areas that relate to department research goals (5year research targets). Then the research coordinator can be provided the list of contacts identified by each department. The research coordinator can then initiate a contact (by email) to explore the possibility of discussing a research collaboration (this can be set up as a Zoom meeting, e.g.). This should be done soon, in advance of

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# **Certificate Course on Humanism, Policy, and Diplomacy Inaugurated at NSU**

"Everyone, including the US, and UN, needs to come forward in resolving the Rohingya issue," stated Vice-Chancellor Professor Atiaul Islam, chairing the inauguration of the 10-week Certificate course on "Humanism, Policy, and Diplomacy" by the Center for Peace Studies (CPS) of North South University held on February 6. The US Ambassador Mr. Earl R. Miller, and Major General Abdul Qayyum Mollah, Head of BIPSOT, NDC, PSC were present in the inauguration as special guests.

Vice-Chancellor Professor Islam also said it was the responsibility of the university to acquire knowledge, disseminate knowledge, and use it in humanitarian work. He added how NSU has always been playing an active role and how it is NSU's responsibility to implement the basic principles of humanitarianism - the fulfillment of fundamental rights, living in a peaceful situation etc.

Dr. Katherine Li, CPS Advisor and Course Coordinator moderated the inaugural session. Professor Sk Tawfique M Haque, the Director of SIPG and CPS, NSU highlighted the context of organizing the course in the event. CPS has been working on peace building research and advocacy activities since 2019 under the South Asian Institute of Policy and Governance (SIPG) at North South University.

Organized in partnership with the Bangladesh Institute of Peace Support Operations Training (BIPSOT), the course is the first of its kind in Bangladesh to discuss humanitarianism, policy, and diplomacy. Ambassador M Shahidul Haque is the course advisor. The course has been organized on zoom.

In his inaugural address, Mr. Miller, Ambassador of the United States Embassy, said that the American Embassy has always been committed to humanitarianism. He emphasized the US standing by Bangladesh in various areas of humanitarian activities, including providing assistance to the Rohingya crisis. BIPSOT-Chief Major General Abdul Qayyum Mollah, ndc, psc, noted that the crises and challenges against humanity are gradually changing. He added, "Our goal is to ensure a safe and peaceful environment. I believe that those who are taking part in this course will help prevent future threats to humanity and play a role in maintaining peace."

42 Participants have joined from

Bangladesh, Canada, Japan, and Italy who are students and professionals in teaching, journalism, government and non-government and international organizations. The trainers of the course are from different universities of Bangladesh, Australia, USA, Thailand etc., from government and non-government organizations, UN various and international organizations.

The topics covered in this course include concepts, principles and history of humanitarian organizations,

their origins, development, and scope of work, conflict resolution and humanitarian initiatives, humanitarian action in climate change and displacement, human rights and gender in the humanitarian crisis, Rwanda in the context of humanism., Darfur, and Somalia Case Study, Humanitarian Diplomacy, The Future of Humanism, etc. One of the notable aspects of the course - despite being an online course - is the physical inspection by the course participants at the Rohingya camp in Cox's Bazar, an example of humanitarianism for refugees. The 4-hour course will run every Saturday afternoon until April 10, 2021 Bangladesh time.

#### Professor Dr. M. Zahid Hasan, NSU IAB Member, Earns the Ernest Orlando Lawrence Award

Professor Dr. M. Zahid Hasan, a member of North South University's International Advisory Board (IAB), has been awarded the Ernest Orlando Lawrence Award (E.O. Lawrence Award) by the US Department of Energy (DOE) in a ceremony held

on January 19, 2021. The award honors midcareer US scientists and engineers for remarkable work in research and development that boost the national, economic and energy security of USA - in accordance with DOE's mission. Dr. Μ Zahid Hasan is Princeton University's Eugene Higgins Professor of Physics and, due to his "groundbreaking discoveries" and astounding contributions in research in the area of condensed matter and material sciences, the US Government has bestowed upon him this highly prestigious and timehonored award.

The establishment of the E.O. Lawrence Award dates

back to 1959. It was founded to honor Ernest Orlando Lawrence as he was a major physics researcher who invented the cyclotron (a type of subatomic particle accelerator) and attained the 1939 Nobel Prize in Physics. Therefore, it comes as no surprise that Lawrence was one of Dr. Hasan's inspirations - all the more reason for everyone to acclaim his stunning achievement. He said, "I am quite honored and humbled to receive this award as E.O Lawrence was one of my

scientific heroes. Lawrence's invention of the cyclotron led to modern high-energy accelerator technology that I use in my research to explore topological states of quantum matter. I am also very grateful to Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory and SLAC National Accelerator Laboratory for supporting my research leading to this award."

Dr. Hasan is one of eight recipients to earn the award, each for a distinct area of

research. The honorable recipients were revealed in an announcement by US Secretary of Energy Dan Brouillette on January 12, 2021. Furthermore, each of the award winners received a citation signed by the secretary of energy, a gold medal resembling Ernest Orlando Lawrence, and \$20,000 as an honorarium. Quoting the award citation, "Hasan's work has opened new areas in condensed matter physics and holds promise for future transformative applications materials sciences. in Guided by predictions from ab initio calculations, he has focused on the search for, and discovery of, new quantum states and topological quasiparticles

such as the helical Dirac fermion and the Weyl fermion." NSU is immensely proud of its fellow IAB member, Dr. M. Zahid Hasan, and wishes him many more of such outstanding achievements in his future endeavors.

### NSU Genome Research Institute finds Rare Mutation in Spike Proteins of SARS-CoV-2

North South University has been the first and only private university in the country to sequence SARS-CoV-2 genomes using their own facilities at our own Genome Research Institute (NSU-GRI). Researchers at NGRI, under the leadership of Professor Hasan Mahmud Reza, Dean of the School of

Health and Life Sciences, NSU and Dr. Muhammad Magsud Hossain, Director NGRI, NSU of have completed sequencing of eight SARS-CoV-2 fifty isolates using Illumina MiSeg platform. Prof. Firoz Ahmed and Prof. Aminul Islam of Noakhali Science and Technology University assisted in providing samples. Other members of the team included Prof. Abdul Khaleque, Prof. Kazi Nadim Hasan, Aura Rahman, Tahrima Hug, Naushin, Abdus Sadique, and Jahidul Alam from NGRI, NSU.

The SARS-CoV-2 virus consists of 29 proteins, of

which the four structural proteins have been the subject of much investigation as potential therapeutic targets. Among these, the spike protein has by far been the most studied one. Spike proteins protrude out of the viral membrane and facilitate its entry into host cells through interacting with surface receptor ACE2. Mutations in spike protein can therefore impact how efficiently the virus is able to penetrate and infect host cells.

NGRI, Bangladesh has reported some rare mutations in these four structural proteins that have not been

found commonly across the globe. Of these, one mutation in the crucial spike protein is hereby being reported for the first time in Bangladesh and thereby in the world. This is the substitution of the amino acid tyrosine (Y) by the amino acid phenylalanine (F) in position 204 of the spike protein (Y204F). This is also to be noted that the genome harboring this mutation belongs to the lineage B.1.36.

Whether or not this mutation has any downstream effects on the structure and function of the SARS-CoV-2 spike protein as well as the virus's infectivity

> is sure to be a topic of further investigation. The same mutation was found in 2 samples sequenced by NGRI as part of a mass sequencing project. The team identifies this lineage as one of the most virulent isolates and it is mutating for its better fitness in the community. The observation is based on the genome sequences available in GISAID for deceased patients from India and Saudi Arabia who were infected with this lineage. Among the

52 Indian genomes available for the deceased, 10 were

infected by this lineage, whereas, in Saudi Arabia among the 121 available genomes, almost 50% were affected by this lineage. Other countries where this lineage has been found include the UK (45%), Denmark (9%), and Canada.

the next CFA for 2021-2022 CTRGC grants, so that this can be planned in advance and grant applications be directed at such collaborative research projects. Where such collaborations are identified, we can work towards having the CTRGC funding request increased above the usual 5 lakh limit (further, a joint funding opportunity should be explored).

2. For new MoUs I recommend each school look at the QS Asia rankings to see which in the top 50 or so may present opportunity for a general MoU that can then be pursued subsequently in subsidiary agreements specific to a school, institute, department, or center. Future MoUs should be strategic in line with the 5-year strategy document we produced.

The event ended with the ending remarks from the higher administrative body members – Honorable Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor and Chairman, Board of Trustees. They appreciated the initiative and shared their thoughts and ideas about the collaborative activities happening between different departments of NSU as well as with other national-international institutions. Along with praising the workshop, they requested the regular arrangement of such effective workshops and meetings further for extending collaboration and development opportunities.

#### NSU Global Health Institute Leads Bangladeshi Survey on Future **Acceptance of COVID-19 Vaccine**

Bangladesh has gone through all the procedures to bring the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine from India. When it comes to scaling up delivery, we now need to consider possible roadblocks, which also involve determining which communities can get it first and at what cost. This research was conducted by a team led by the North South University (NSU) Global Health Institute among adults who were over 18 years of age. Other team members included the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB), the Rangpur- Hypertension and Research

Center and the Bangladesh Centre for Injury Prevention and Research (CIPRB).

Between December 12, 2020 and January 7, 2021, a total of 3,647 people (the response rate was 81 percent) were included in the survey. Interviewers obtained the information from participants through face-to-face interviews from eight districts of the country, including metropolitan cities, Upazilas, villages and urban slums. The study found that if it is free, effective, secure and recommended by the government, 74.6

percent of individuals plan to take a vaccine. 17.6 percent of respondents, meanwhile, were unsure if they would take it. 7.8 percent, on the other hand, were reluctant to take. Intent to vaccinate was regarded as 'acceptance of vaccine' while uncertain and unwilling to vaccinate were consecutively considered as 'vaccine hesitancy' and 'unacceptance of vaccine.'

The study also found that the intention to vaccinate among daylabors was significantly lower than respondents from other professions. Rickshaw pullers, road-side sellers, regular drivers, etc., were considered day-labors. Just 46.8 percent of day-laborers reported willingness to vaccinate, while the numbers for other occupational groups ranged from 62 percent to 83 percent. The highest intention to take the vaccine was stated by the office workers with a monthly wage, and it is 82 percent. The acceptance of vaccinations by medical doctors or nurses was 81 percent. The findings indicate that people with a higher income than those with a lower income were more likely to support a vaccine.

According to this study, relative to the city population, individuals residing in the rural region displayed both vaccine hesitancy and reluctance group showed 68% interest.

The gender gap in vaccine acceptance was slight and the figure was 76% for males and 73% for females, respectively. The study also discussed the current chronic condition and the acceptance among the study respondents of the COVID-19 vaccine. It seems that people with underlying conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, asthma. kidnev diseases, etc. demonstrated a lack of interest in the vaccine. For various diseases, the vaccine acceptance rate ranged from

to vaccinate against COVID-19. The vaccine acceptance rate shown by rural people was 64 percent. Except for urban slums, city people showed the highest interest in vaccination and the figure is 81 percent while the amount is 53 percent from the slum.


Older adults over 60 years of age have shown a low prevalence of vaccine acceptance, 61 percent. Other age groups have shown a similar trend of vaccine acceptance in adults, especially between 18 and 50. Younger individuals under 30 years of age, for instance, reported 74 percent of vaccine approval, while individuals from the age groups 31-40 years and 41-50 years of age showed 73 percent and 78 percent, respectively. And individuals in the 51-60 age 53 percent to 61 percent.

Those who identified COVID-19 illness on their own were no more likely than other respondents to respond positively to the vaccine issue. The acceptance rate of this group is 56%. If costs are involved with vaccination, the overall vaccine acceptance rate fell to 46 percent in another vaccine acceptance issue. Thus, more than half of the individuals did not show interest in taking vaccines by spending money.

In conducting mass vaccination campaigns in the country, building

people's confidence in the vaccine will be a major challenge. For people with low literacy to understand it, communication messages must be designed so that the level of faith in the vaccine and the acceptance of the COVID-19 vaccine in Bangladesh can be increased. In order to help create confidence in a possible COVID-19 vaccine, valued community-based

individuals and non-governmental organizations should be unbiased on the side effects or problems of taking the vaccine. We must keep in mind that the findings are a snapshot taken at a point in time, but with frequent changes in the perceived risk of disease and the development of COVID-19 vaccines themselves, individuals may change.



## NSU Earns No. 1 Rank for Research Publications Among All Universities of Bangladesh

North South University has been revealed to have produced the highest number of research publications among all the top universities in Bangladesh, both public and private, according to a recent report by The Business Standard (TBS). The report, published on the TBS website on January 19, 2021, analyzes each of these universities' roles in research in 2019. According to their data, NSU has produced 1135 publications and it has ranked 5<sup>th</sup> among the top 10 private universities in terms of research expenditure, spending BDT 6,53,00,000 solely on research.

Research work conducted bv universities is, undoubtedly, of crucial importance for any country's advancement and growth, be it economic or intellectual. Therefore, despite the rather underdeveloped situation in Bangladesh in terms of research, NSU is relentlessly striving to relieve the country of such a detrimental issue. This is evident as the university secured the top spot for research publications and, thus, it may well be said that NSU is fruitfully making the most out of research funding in the country.

Nonetheless, NSU strives beyond

contributing knowledge merely within the boundaries of this country - rather, the university strives to emanate knowledge like a ripple, through its research, to every other nation around the globe so that the world may



#### progress as one.

The Vice-Chancellor of NSU, Professor Atiqul Islam's words to TBS echoes this significant notion of the role of research. He said to TBS, "Our country's universities have mostly been disseminating knowledge from foreign books and research. Now we are trying to generate knowledge for our own nation as well as for other nations."

Impressively, Professor Atiqul Islam also mentioned, "Most of the research and articles of NSU's researchers are

being published in internationally recognized journals. We are doing well in research. We have connections with Cambridge University, The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) and many other international organizations." Furthermore, his words, "Actually, we have no funding constraints. We are providing funds as per researchers' needs. But we want quality and world standard work," exhibits NSU's high standards regarding any work it conducts - the university is not willing to compromise quality at any cost.

He also added, "Our students can easily get scholarships and admission at the world's reputed universities showing research work that they conducted with their teachers at our university. A good amount of skilled manpower is also generated through the research," which depicts NSU's fruitful efforts to attain academic excellence – the benefits of which its students are free to reap.

NSU aspires to climb even higher and attain the number 1 ranking in research expenditure in addition to its top spot in publications produced so that the rest of the world, alongside Bangladesh, may flourish.

## NSU CTRG Funds Academic Collaboration between DEML, NSU and DEH, BRAC

The Department of English & Modern Languages (DEML) of NSU and the Department of English and Humanities, BRAC University copresented the major finding of the NSU CTRG (2019-2020) funded project "Outcome based curriculum design and implementation: Problems, Strategies and Implications for English Language Teaching at two private universities in Dhaka, Bangladesh" at a data sharing session at a webinar on Saturday, 27 February 2021 on Zoom.

The Chair of DEML, Professor Dr. AQMA Rahman Bhuiyan introduced

#### International Webinar on "Post Corona Neurological Complications and Management" Held

An international scientific webinar was jointly organized by the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences of North South University and Bangladesh Neuroscience Society, as part of addressing the current corona situation subsequent challenges and in Bangladesh. The main topic of this webinar was the importance of post-corona neurological complex and its management guidelines. Dr. Hasan Mahmud Reza, Dean, School of Health and Life Sciences, North South University, and Dr. Ashrafur Rahman, Mohammad Assistant Professor, Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences, conducted a survey on mental health complications of Covid - 19 infected patients in Bangladesh. From July 25, 2020 to January 10, 2021, in total 2037 Covid-19 infected patients aged between 20 to 60 vears participated in this survey. The survey was not made only via online survey; they also physically took face to face interviews and Q&A sessions of few patients. The study found that 75.2% of participants had severe mental distress and 16.3% had severe depression. On the other hand, the tendency of partial amnesia is noticeable in 52.7% of the patients. Other complications include loss of sense of smell (84.2%), headache (93.7%), insomnia (76.3%), fatigue and exhaustion (81.6%), muscle pain (66.0%), and many more.

In the above mentioned scientific webinar regarding post-corona neurological complications, Dr. Manzoor Rony from the University

of Illinois in the United States, Dr. Mohammed Uddin Dafil from The Hospital for Sick Children, Canada, and Dr. Il Su Moon from the Dongguan University College of Medicine in South Korea presented significant portion of their thoughts and research on the global Corona situation. The importance of meditation, its science-based techniques and methods in dealing with corona-related mental complications were discussed by Dr. Il Su Moon. Dr. Monzur presented the mental health information of the United States' corona patients. Dr. Dafil shed light on the genetic defects and neurological complications of corona patients. Dr. Forkan Uddin, Head of Clinical (Neurogen Research Children's Healthcare) has provided guidance on coping with post-corona mental health problems in Bangladesh. Dr. GM Sayedur Rahman, Chairman, Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences, North South University, started the webinar with a welcome address at the webinar. The President of this webinar, Dr. Hasan Mahmud Reza said that it is very important to provide services to the patients by opening special corners in different hospitals and clinics to solve the post-Covid complications in Bangladesh. He discussed the importance of information and guidance received from this webinar in dealing with the deadly covid-19 pandemic in Bangladesh, and announced the end of the event with a vote of thanks.

#### Will Myanmar's Recent Military Coup Affect Rohingya Issue?



Webinar to discuss the impacts of military coup in Myanmar on the Rohingya crisis attended by Brigadier General (Rtd.) M Sakhawat Hossain, Senior Fellow of SIPG, Ambassador Shahidul Haque, Professorial fellow of SIPG, Professor Lailufar Yasmin of Dhaka University, and faculty of Sultan Joynal Abedin University from Malaysia, Dr. Mahbubul Haque joined the webinar as panelists.

On February 8, the Center for Peace Studies (CPS) under the South Asian Institute of Policy and Governance (SIPG) of North South University has organized a webinar to discuss the impacts of the military coup in Myanmar on the Rohingya crisis. Brigadier General (Rtd.) M Sakhawat Hossain, Senior Fellow of SIPG, Ambassador Shahidul Haque, Professorial fellow of SIPG, Professor Lailufar Yasmin of Dhaka University, and faculty of Sultan Joynal Abedin University from Malaysia, Dr. Mahbubul Haque joined the webinar as panelists.

The issue of Rohingyas being stateless and seeking refuge in Bangladesh, for more than four decades, has drawn global attention in 2016-2017 when more than 700,000 Rohingya refugees from Myanmar fled to Bangladesh to escape genocide. The webinar provided feedback on the military rule of various ethnic groups living in Myanmar, including the Rohingya community living in Bangladesh and Malaysia. In addition, the geopolitical context, its impacts on Bangladesh-Myanmar bilateral relations, and the lack of a strong role in the Western world also came up.

Speaking on the state of democracy in Myanmar, Professor Lailufar Yasmin said that the fight for democracy is not actually for democracy because the military rule is constitutionally sanctioned. SIPG senior fellow Dr. Sakhawat Hossain pointed out the impacts of Myanmar's military rule on the Rohingya crisis, mentioning that the country's State Counselor had never had good relations with Myanmar in the past. Disagreeing with the remarks, Ambassador Shahidul Hague noted that since the country's State Counselor was born and raised in a military family, she had always had good relations with the military. He added that there was little difference between her views on the Rohingya and the current military junta in Myanmar. Rather there is a planned plot behind the current military coup, which has not yet been revealed.

Dr. Mahbubul Hague from Malaysia focused on the regional political dynamics. He thinks that ASEAN is silent on the issue because of its non-interference policy, which is unfortunate. After the military coup in Myanmar, there has not been much official protest in other Southeast Asian countries. Common people of those countries, however, demonstrated some protests. He also highlighted our limited knowledge about Myanmar, which serves as an obstacle to resolving the Rohingya issue. NSU Professorial Fellow Ambassador Shahidul Haque emphasized the need to strengthen the process of justice for the Rohingya genocide in the ICJ. He also stressed

that Bangladesh's strategy should be adopted by understanding this situation.

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Dr. Ishrat Zakia Sultana, CPS Coordinator, moderated the session while NSU's Confucius Institute director Dr. Bulbul Siddiqui gave the welcome speech. Among others, Professor Sk. Tawfique Haque, Director of SIPG and CPS, faculties, researchers, and representatives of international organizations also joined the webinar. CPS has been working on peace research and advocacy activities since 2019.

## Webinar on "East West Street, the ICJ, Genocide and the Rohingya" Held on February 24, 2021

The Department of Law organized its second international webinar on the 24<sup>th</sup> of February, 2021. Professor Philippe Sands QC, Professor of the Public Understanding of Law, University College London, had spoken on 'East West Street, the ICJ, Genocide and the Rohingya'.

The talk had begun, following introductory remarks by Professor Md. Rizwanul Islam, Chair of the Department of Law at North South University.

NSU OEA organized an online information session on January 21 with Saint Mary's University, Canada. The event was attended by a number of distinguished guests representing both Saint Mary's University delegation team and the Canadian University Application Center (CUAC). The guests included Dr. Mohammad Rahaman, Associate Dean, Strategic Partnership and Community Engagement, Sobey School of Business; Ms. Linda Te, Director and Regional Manager, CUAC Global Marketing; Mr. Samuel Turpin, Student Recruitment Officer, Saint Mary's University; Mr. Kazi Rahman, Senior Recruitment Officer, Saint Mary's University; Mr. Warren Mosley, Senior Recruitment Officer, Saint Mary's University; and Mr. Shafkat Chowdhury, Director, Global Logistics and Bangladesh Office, CUAC Bangladesh Office. The online event started with a commencement speech from Ms. Linda about the strong relationship between Canadian University Application Center and NSU. She mentioned that the organization's first school connection was with NSU and the Director of Global Logistics of the Bangladesh Office. During the session, a detailed presentation was provided about the educational programs and facilities in Saint Mary's University. The speakers emphasized on the success of Saint Mary's University's business school and the fact that the university is the second largest research university in Canada. Adding to that, the speakers spoke about cultural diversity aspects via mentioning that 32% of the Saint Mary's University students are international students coming from over 115 countries. #### North South University Announces Waiver for Spring 2021

North South University has been taking many initiatives during the global pandemic due to Covid-19. It is to be noted that, in the Summer & amp; Fall 2020 semesters, a significant amount of fees were waived. Considering the overall situation, NSU authority has decided to continue with the waiver for Spring 2021 Semester like the last semester. All Student-activity fees (library fee, computer lab fee and other fees) have been waived. In addition, 10% of the tuition fees would be waived. The total waiver of the fees would amount approximately to 20% for the Spring 2021.

In addition to the waiver, NSU has been taking other initiatives for student welfare. Around 1300 children of the brave freedom fighters of 1971 have been given the opportunity to study at NSU without any fees. Further, a special scholarship has been given to the students of NSU who lost their parents during the Corona pandemic.

Since the establishment of this university, it has provided financial assistance of 150 crore taka to the

students till date. Approximately 18 crore taka has been provided as scholarships to meritorious and needy students over the last 12 months. North South University staff members have donated 2 days of their salary amounting to 50 Lacs taka to the relief fund of the Honorable Prime Minister, NSU has also distributed 11000 bags of relief material through the Bangladesh Army and Police among the affected families during the pandemic. North South University wishes overall success of the students and seeks sincere cooperation of all in this regard.
